#### **GRANTS COMMITTEE REPORT**

#### What is Vital Signs?

What are the issues facing our communities? How are we responding? Is there a way you can make a difference? These are just some of the questions tackled by Vital Signs, a national program of Canada's community foundations. Communities are using Vital Signs to generate discussion about priorities & tackle quality of life issues like housing, youth safety and environmental quality.

Vital Signs is a check-up that measures the quality of life in Canadian communities, identifies trends, & shares opportunities for action.

Vital Signs is creating new connections between a wide range of community groups. The report's reader-friendly data introduces citizens from all walks of life to the successes and challenges within their own communities & encourages them to take action.

Measuring the vitality of the Boundary in key issues helps the Phoenix Foundation to:

- Increase the effectiveness of our grant-making.
- Better inform our donors about issues & opportunities in the community.
- Assist us in making connections between individuals & groups to address those issues.

Phoenix Foundation did an extensive Vital Signs process and produced a report to the community in 2009. Since then, the key areas of concern highlighted by the report have guided our granting decision making processes. Here are the grants we have provided since 2010 to address the range of issues facing the Boundary region.

#### 2010 - 2012 grants

#### Key Issue: Learning

- Purchases for libraries in Grand Forks, Greenwood, Midway & outreach to Rock Creek.
- Purchase educational toys for Sunshine Valley Little People's Centre & for BFISS child & youth therapy room.

#### Key Issue: Health and Wellness

- Fence in a designated area for a dog park.
- Refit space for the Red Cross Health Equipment Loan Cupboard to disinfect equipment returned from loan.
- Support Options for Sexual Health Pap-a-looza events.
- Purchase of playground equipment for Perley Elementary School.
- Purchase defibrillator for Rock Creek Medical Society.

#### Key Issue: Housing

- Common Room in the Habitat for Humanity Multiplex Housing Project.
- Purchase equipment for BETHS extreme weather facility.

#### Key Issue: Arts and Culture

Purchase equipment and/or furniture for the Boundary Museum (x2) & Grand Forks Art Gallery.

#### Key Issue: Gap between rich and poor

• Purchase equipment for the Boundary Food Bank & for Whispers of Hope Benevolent Society (x2 each).

#### Meeting our community's ever-changing needs

When you establish an Unrestricted Fund, your gift addresses a broad range of local needs – including future needs that often cannot be anticipated at the time your gift is made. 




