GRANTS COMMITTEE REPORT

In this year's granting cycle the Grants Committee received thirteen letters of intent with a total of \$93,307.25 requested. In the end, the Directors approved funding for eleven projects, which were valued at \$30,109.50.

This year the Foundation provided funding for one of its largest projects ever, to support the Multi-Agency Accommodation Project, which brings together three community agencies under one roof. This project also met three Vital Signs priorities in the Community: Housing, Poverty and Employment.

The major accomplishment this year was the completion of the Grant Committee Orientation Manual, a huge undertaking completed by Linda Manzon. This document will provide guidance and support for Grant Committee members for many years to come.

At the fall granting meeting, Linda Manzon is handing over the duty of chairing the grants committee to George Longden. Linda will continue to be a board member as well as a part of the Grants Committee until June 2014.

It has been an immense privilege to work with our community agencies as we all strive for the vision of 'making a better Boundary'. While we regret that Rob Ogloff, who has been on the Grants Committee since 2006 is leaving in December, we also welcome new members Kathy O'Malley and Lynne Burch, recently retired CAO of the City of Grand Forks to the committee.

These young people were participants in the Young Stewards of the Boundary, Summer Environmental Education Project. A grant from the Phoenix Foundation to the Christina Lake Stewardship Society helped make this Summer Program possible.

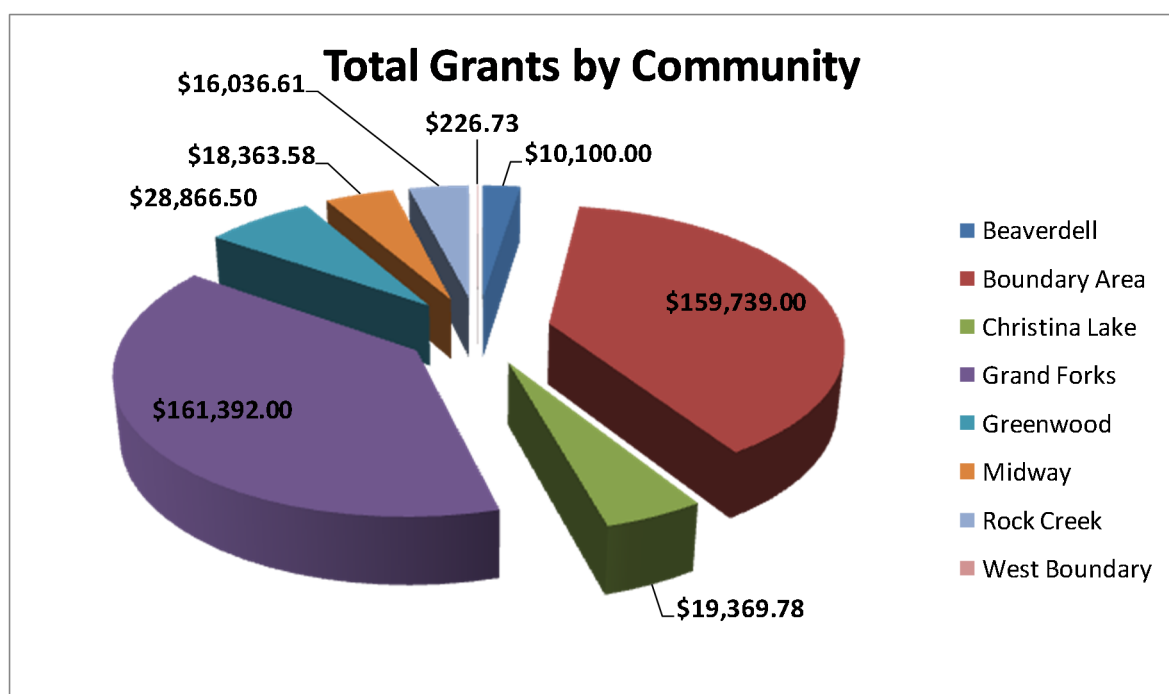
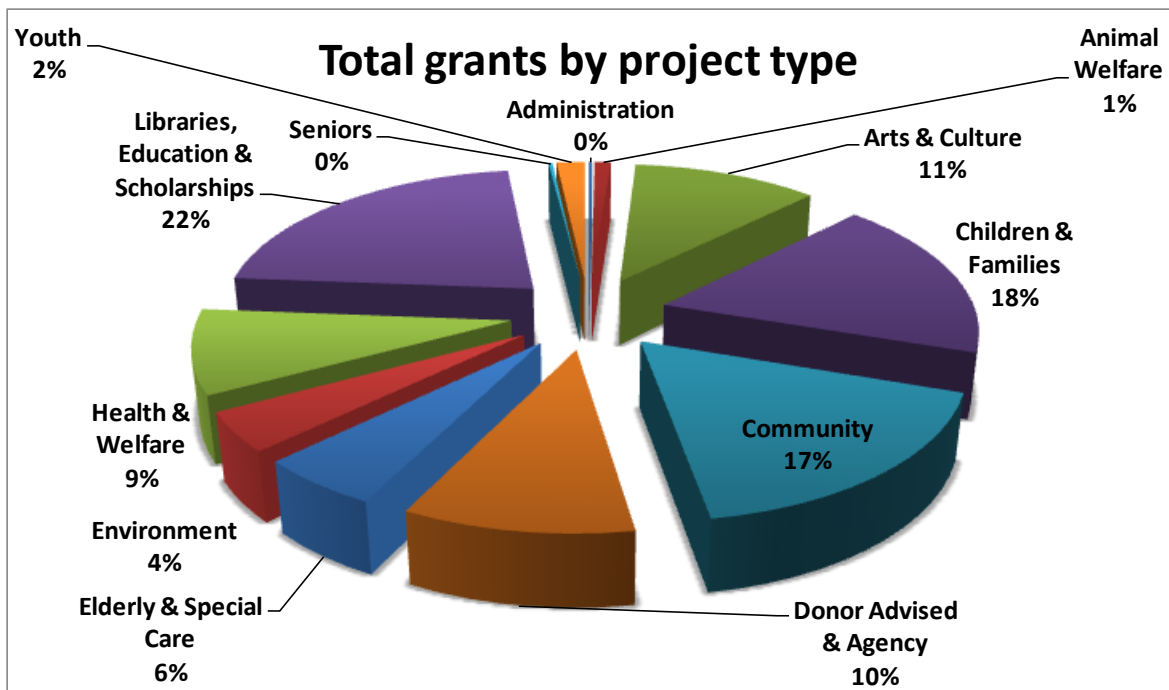

If you're not already working in the field, consider a career in the non-profit sector. There are many job search websites that list non-profit job opportunities.

Inform yourself about the community through media, research and by talking to people. Understanding local issues and challenges, and talking about them, helps build awareness and support for

Purchase tickets to performances by local arts groups. Support organizations selling books, calendars or raffle tickets as fundraisers. Some organizations are membership based; consider joining one that means more to you.

Think about the time you have to give, skills you have to share, and what you want to achieve personally and for the community. Then call your favourite charitable organization, local community club or school to find out if it could use a hand.
