GRANTS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Grants Committee welcomed two new members this year, Leora Gesser who retired recently from Selkirk College and Dennis Thome. Actually, we should say welcome back to Dennis, as he has been a part of the Grants Committee in the past.

In this year's granting cycle the Grants Committee received twelve Letters of Intent. After careful consideration and research, nine applicants were asked to submit a formal application. The requests for funding totaled \$121,746.42 and the amount allotted for this year was \$46,500.05. The funds actually allocated were \$44,931.20. The amount unallocated was \$1,568.85 from the Animal endowment. This money was not allocated because the applications for this funding did not meet the requirements for funding as laid down in the Grants Committee Manual.

This granting cycle featured a number of applications from the West Boundary that were funded. The actual funding was disbursed to projects from Christina Lake to Rock Creek, clearly within the mandate of the Phoenix Foundation to fund projects throughout the Boundary. The major funding was granted to the Rotary Club of Grand Forks for their Rotary Spray Park, a very ambitious \$300,000.00 project which is to be completed in 2015.

It is a great privilege to work with such committed and talented individuals, as the Grants Committee strives to follow the mandate of the Foundation. Our community partners are to be commended as well, as they bring high quality projects to the Grants Committee for funding, which will truly make a difference to the Boundary Community.

We look towards 2015 knowing that we have the Vital Signs 2014 document that will inform the decisions made in the next granting cycle. A grant writing workshop is scheduled for January at Selkirk College in Grand Forks, led by Brenda LaCroix, which hopefully will lead to another great year of excellent grants to be funded by the Foundation.

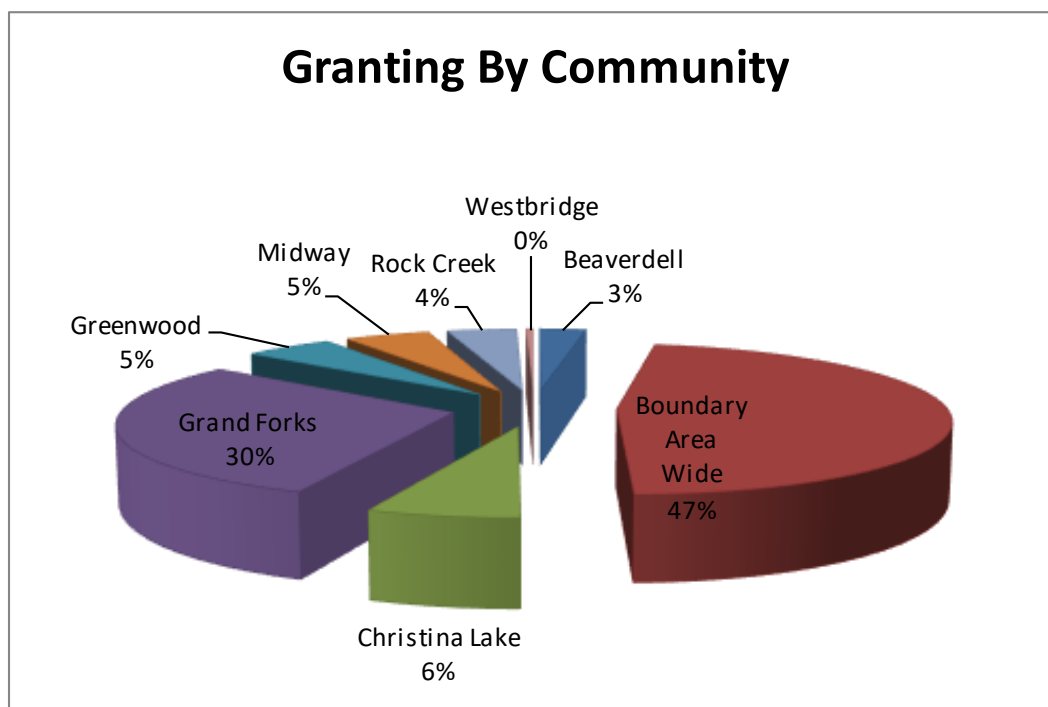
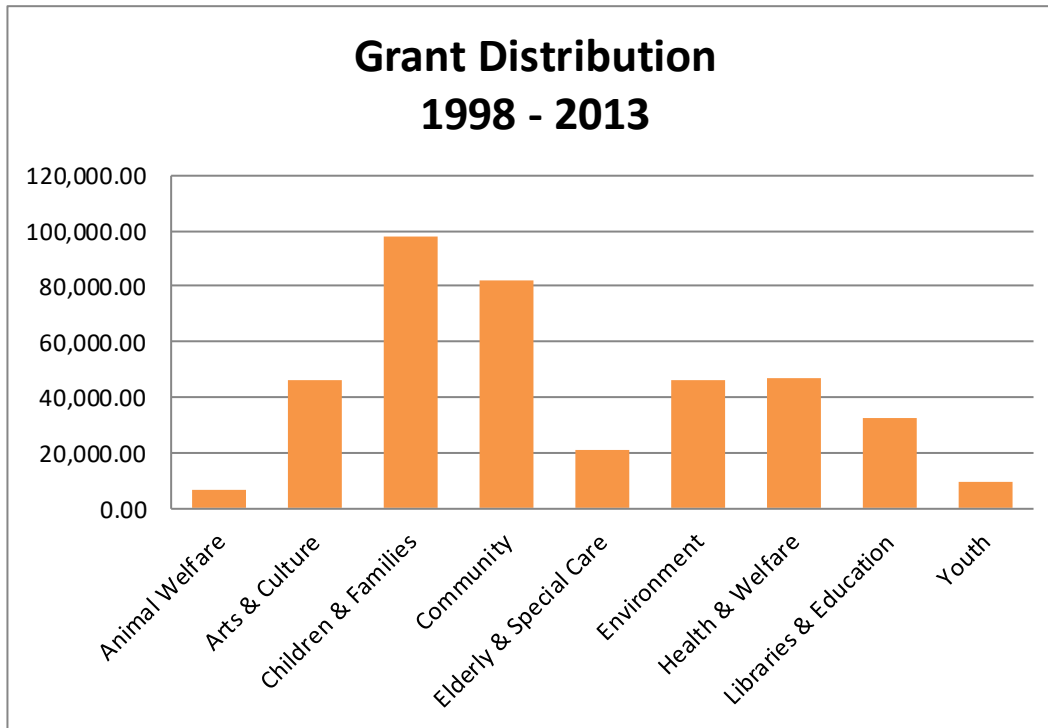
