## GRANTS COMMITTEE REPORT

In this year's granting cycle the Grants Committee received twenty letters of intent with a total of \$152,089.66 requested. In the end, the Foundation Directors approved funding for twelve projects, which were valued at \$39,809.45.

This was the second year that the Foundation has participated in funding what is arguably one of the largest projects ever undertaken by a service club in the Boundary, the Rotary Spray park in City Park in Grand Forks. Also funded this year was an application by Grand Forks Fire Rescue to create a dedicated training facility for live fire suppression, one of the hardest situations for volunteer firefighters to train for. This facility will be available for all volunteer firefighters in the Boundary.

Once again, the Phoenix Foundation has funded projects throughout the Boundary, from Bridesville in the west to Christina Lake in the east. Including the grants for the 2015 granting cycle, a total of \$427, 532.18 has been granted by the Phoenix Foundation to communities throughout the Boundary since 1998.

It is with considerable regret that I step down as chair of the Grants Committee. Fortunately Suzanne Lee, a new board member of the Foundation, has agreed to take on the position as chair. I will be supporting her as she gets started, and Linda Manzon, the previous Grants Committee chair, has also offered her support.

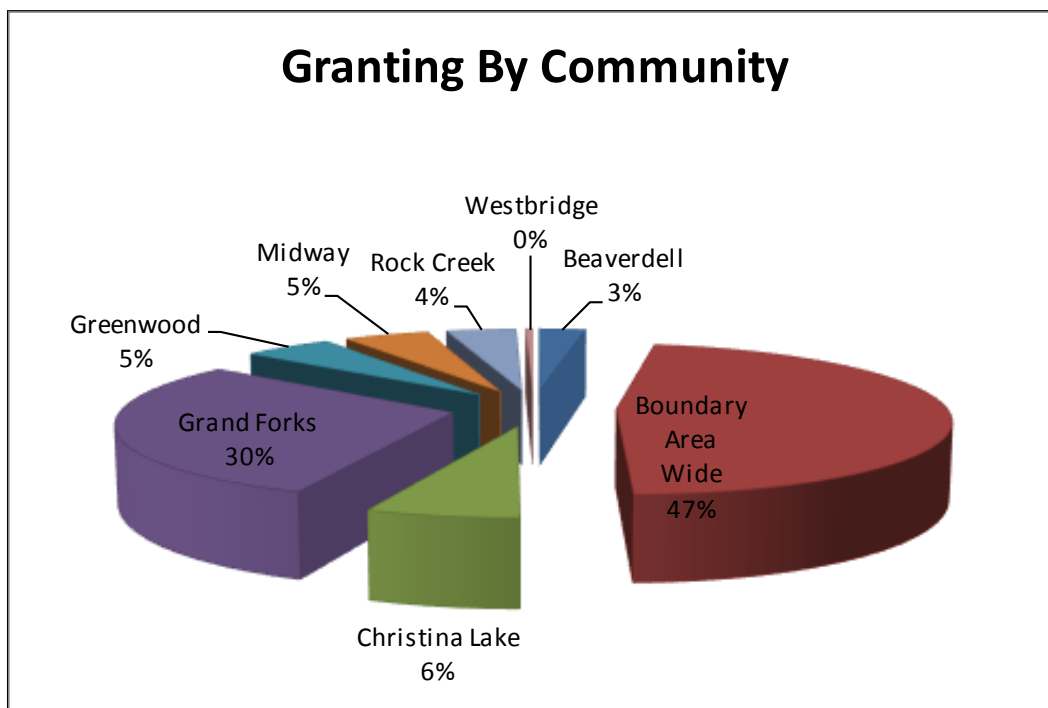
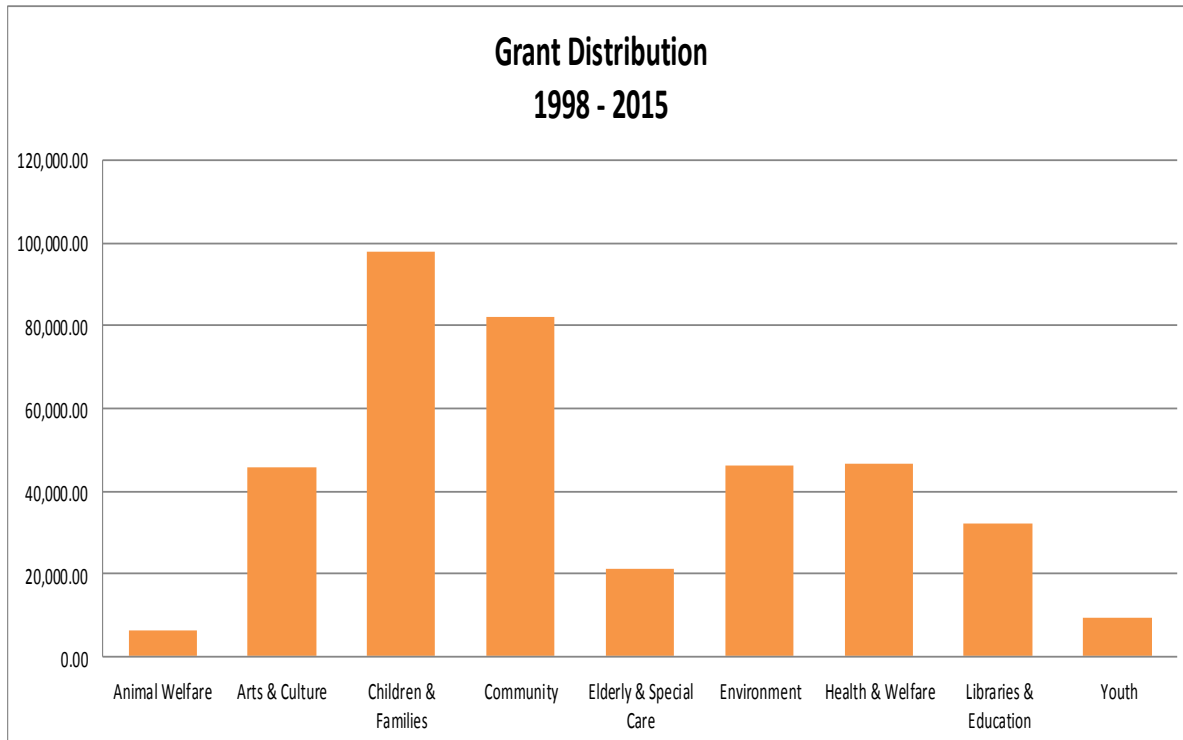
